
#### **Activity 1- Challenges**


The attendees discusses the main challenges for newcomers when seeking housing. Below is a list of the common challenges identified by the attendees:


- Lack of housing availability
- Cost of housing (utilities plus already inflated rent)
- Lack of references
- Airbnbs
- Lack of credit for utilities and for credit check for rentals
- Living wage not being provided
- Lack of downpayment
- BC Housing restrictions on who can apply
- Limitations placed on renters (types of food to cook, access to amentities, etc)
- Language and cultural barriers
- Pets
- Discrimation/racism
- Access to information on availability, processes and subsidies
- Challenges attracting developers to invest and build more homes
- Location of housing in relation to work, transportation and other key services
- Quality of rentals
- Restrictions on how many people can live in rentals
- Lack of availability for homes to accommodate families
- Short term rentals are discouraged or not at all available
- Lack of information or awareness of renter rights and landlord responsibilities
- Too much information that is scattered across multiple platforms

CBAL shared the challenges as identified in a survey of 90 newcomers from across the Basin and Boundary.



Opportunity	Description	Potential Partnerships
Workshops & Education	Provide newcomers with a series of workshops focusing on tenancy rights, building relationships with landlords, housing research, applying for rentals, caring for home and conflict resolution	Settlement agency, property management, advocacy centres, community services, employment agencies and other local community groups with expertise in these areas.
	Provide information and resources for landlords on cultural agility	Setllement agency, property management agencies, local community members, municipalities and housing coalitions.
