Connection to Community is Key

Sara came to Kelowna from Mexico with three children in July 2021, wanting to reunite the family with her husband who had arrived a year earlier to work on a construction contract. Initially it was difficult. She was very lonely with her husband at work all day. She felt

that she had lost her life. In February 2022, she learned about the Family Hub and now she loves it so much that she is on a mission to tell everyone about it.

"This place is the best for me. It is a great opportunity for all people with different situations. For me, my daughter can learn to play with other kids and practice English. I can talk with other moms, which is very important, and I also get connected to the community and other resources."

"The Food Support program is a great help for me because only my husband has a job and I look after our three kids. The Hub is a great opportunity for everyone. In my case, I can practice my English and I can connect to the community — this is the best for me. The Hub is for all people. Don't worry about your situation — the most important thing is when you are here, you can find different options."

Immigrant Services

Welcoming Newcomers, Building Belonging

This year, we supported over 4381 immigrants and refugees as they built their lives in Canada. From emergency wildfire responses to longterm settlement and employment supports, our culturally responsive services help newcomers feel seen, safe, and supported as they navigate their journey to belonging.



Valeriia, at nine months pregnant, arrived in Kelowna on New Years' Eve in 2022 with her 2-year old daughter Jannat and gave birth only 6 days later to her daughter Ayat. She fled Ukraine with her

husband and daughter to a refugee camp in Germany where the family applied for a visa. In December, Valeriia and Jannat received their visas and the family made the difficult decision to come to Canada without Valeriia's husband.

"We had just a miracle story. Some things in your life you feel like are pre-arranged. My host family – although I wish we could meet under different circumstances than a war - we perfectly match. We feel like we are family."

"I came without money. We were not able to work while in the refugee camp. I came with two suitcases and my one daughter and the one in my tummy - and that's it." -Participant

With over 188 job and training outcomes, our Employment Services team walked alongside hundreds of individuals seeking purpose and opportunity. Whether newcomers, youth, older adults, or people living with diverse abilities-our programs helped job seekers step into new chapters of independence and self-worth.



Janelle: A Grateful Mother's Story

After struggling through university, job loss, and a diagnosis of autism and ADHD, my son became withdrawn and deeply depressed. As a mother and life skills coach, it was heartbreaking to watch him give up.

When I discovered KCR's Jobs4All program, I initially thought it could help the clients I support at work, but I soon realized it could help my own family too. I connected both my son and my brother to the program.

The transformation was incredible. My son started smiling again, sharing his goals, and standing tall with confidence. Today, he's working full-time and saving for a house. I'm so grateful to KCR, not only for helping him, but for giving me peace of mind as a mother.

A Full Circle Journey: Deanna Notte's 30+ Years with KCR

Deanna began her KCR journey in 1986 as a high school volunteer on the Youth Crisis Line. After returning as a Social Work practicum student in 1994, she was hired in 1995 and has never looked back. Over 30+ years, she's held key roles including Crisis Line Coordinator, Manager of Employment Services, and Manager of Family Services. Today, she serves as an Adoption Social Worker with the Adoption Centre of B.C.

"KCR has been my work family through every stage of life," says Deanna. Her journey reflects the impact of volunteering, mentorship, and meaningful connection, core to KCR's 40-year legacy.
