## **PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION OF BC FARM TO SCHOOL SALAD BAR: A REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS**

An Invitation

"For the first time ever children may not live as long as their parents". This was a conclusion of BC's Select Standing Committee on Health when exploring childhood obesity. The problem? Sedentary lifestyles and poor food choices. The solution? Encourage children to exercise more and to make healthier food choices!

The Farm to School Salad Bar Initiative aims to do just that. This program funded by the British Columbia Healthy Living Alliance (BCHLA), and managed by the Public Health Association of British Columbia (PHABC) aims to prevent childhood obesity by increasing access to fresh, locally-grown, nutritious, safe and culturally appropriate foods on school premises.

The idea is refreshingly simple! A relationship is developed between a school and a local farm. The PHABC, in partnership with provincial, regional and local groups, will pilot the Farm to School Salad Bar initiative within 12 schools in the Northern and Interior health regions. All 12 pilots must be planned, implemented and evaluated by June 30, 2009. We invite you to participate! This is your opportunity to submit a proposal for a one-time grant to a maximum of \$20,000 (or \$35,000 for schools with high needs) to launch and sustain a Farm to School Salad Bar in your community. 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### **THE CORPORATE CONNECTION**

With the rise of the corporate social responsibility movement within the for-profit sector, the gap between the corporate world and the non-profit sector seems to be shrinking. But that is not to say that the bridge between the two is fully understood by both sides. Businesses of all sizes are increasingly looking for ways to be more responsible and ethical, either by running their businesses in a more sustainable fashion or by using more environmentally-friendly methods of production. There is also a growing trend for companies to lend a helping hand and give back to the communities in which they live and work. Experience is showing that this benefits the community, the business and the employees. It is a win-win-win situation. The non-profit sector is also beginning to realize the benefits of joining forces with the corporate world. By welcoming a corporate partnership, an organization has the potential to expand on their existing resources, extend their reach and leverage a new pool of networks. Wendy Mitchell, Manager of Corporate Citizenship & Fund Development at Volunteer Canada, has worked closely with 23 national corporations. "Businesses truly want to give back to the communities in which they work and live but often come up against communication barriers," she says. "Businesses and non-profits do not always speak the same language when it comes to building a partnership, despite both having the same goal in mind". ### **NEW RESOURCE ON VOLUNTEER SCREENING FROM PUBLIC SAFETY CANADA**

Public Safety Canada has just released its latest resource for the voluntary sector, prepared and distributed in collaboration with Volunteer Canada, *Best Practices Guidelines for Screening Volunteers: Finding the Right Match* is a handbook that refers to resources and provides guidance to volunteer groups and agencies in putting appropriate practices in place concerning screening of volunteers, particularly those working with children and other vulnerable persons. Aimed specifically at small and medium-sized organizations that depend on volunteers to achieve their mission, the handbook covers such topics as what is screening, what are the crucial steps, and provides detailed advice on implementing best practices. ## **HR COUNCIL RELEASES FIRST LABOUR FORCE STUDY REPORT**

The HR Council for the Voluntary & Non-profit Sector (HR Council) is currently conducting a comprehensive labour force study that will shape strategies to attract, develop and retain appropriately qualified people to work in the voluntary and nonprofit sector. The first report, *Toward a Labour Force Strategy for Canada's Voluntary & Non-profit Sector*, brings the sector's paid labour force into focus and examines the key trends and demands that shape the sector's needs for people and skills. In July, the HR Council will release results of surveys of sector employers and employees conducted by Ipsos Reid. These surveys will provide statistical information on a number of areas including the demographics of sector employees, the issues and challenges related to recruitment and retention of employees, and the skill requirements and other key HR challenges that organizations and individuals face.
