NEW EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM: GREY POWER

KCR is excited to announce that they are launching a new employment program – Grey Power – in January 2013. If you live in the Central Okanagan and are 55 years of age or over, not EI eligible and looking to enter or re-enter the workforce then this may be the program for you. Grey Power will provide job search assistance to eligible Participants that includes 6 weeks of classroom training followed by a 6 week subsidized work experience.

In-class training includes: career exploration, basic computer training, resumes, cover letters, interview preparation, networking and certification in short term training such as First Aid, Food Safe, WHMIS, World Host Certificates. There is no cost to Participants and a training allowance is provided during the classroom training. Supports also include weekly job club and 6 month follow-up. Our first classroom session starts on January 7, 2013.

Accreditation is a process that demonstrates a provider has met standards for the quality of its services. CARF International establishes these standards to guide providers in offering their services and also uses the standards to evaluate how well a provider is serving people and how it can improve.



For the past year, KCR has prepared for our accreditation. In late November and early December, CARF International sent a team of professionals to visit our sites and evaluate our services for quality. These surveyors

reviewed our policies and procedures, and consulted with the staff members, people we serve, funders and referring agencies. Based on the surveyors' initial feedback, we are hoping to be formally granted the accreditation. We expect formal notification in late January.

We recognize the contribution each KCR staff member made to prepare for this rigorous assessment and thank-you for your enduring dedication to the agency and, most importantly, to the participants we serve. A thank-you also to our funders and referring agencies for your ongoing support of KCR. Though the process of preparing for CARF Accreditation was time consuming and involved, we strongly believe we are the better agency for having completed this process.

BMO HOLIDAY STUDY FINDS CANADIANS MOVING AWAY FROM TRADITIONAL GIVING

This holiday season, many Canadians are opting for charitable giving rather than handing over a traditional gift-wrapped present to family, friends and colleagues. According to a study issued by BMO Harris Private Banking, almost two-thirds of Canadians (62%) say they would prefer having someone make a donation on their behalf instead of receiving a gift. The study, which examined donating and volunteering in Canada, revealed that a growing number of Canadians are open to changing the concept of holiday gift-giving. Other key findings include:



- More than three-quarters (78%) say they would consider making a charitable donation on someone else's behalf instead of giving a tangible gift.
- Almost half (45%) volunteered over the past year.

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SURVEY IDENTIFIES GREATEST CHALLENGES WHEN STARTING A NEW JOB

Workers who ring in the new year with a new job may find learning the ropes to be their biggest challenge, a new Accountemps survey suggests. Nearly half (49%) of employees and 39% of managers interviewed said mastering new processes and procedures tops their list of concerns when joining a company. Twenty-three percent from each group cited getting to know a new boss and colleagues as the greatest hurdle. Fitting into organizational culture was also a concern (15% employees; 21% managers), as was learning how to use technology and tools (7% employees; 14% managers). For more>>>

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CANADIANS PREFER ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY GIFT GIVING

The environment continues to play an important role in Canadian gift-giving decisions this year. A new survey by Harris Interactive shows Canadians prefer to give and receive green gifts for the holidays. Three in four Canadians prefer to give gifts that benefit the environment, while 73% of Canadians want to receive environmentally-thoughtful presents for the holidays. Canadians are consistently more environmentally friendly than Americans in their gift giving. (This year 75% of Canadians prefer to give green gifts versus just 67% of Americans). More>>>

Eligible applicants include BC non-profit arts and/or cultural organizations, First Nations band councils or friendship centres. **The application deadline is Feb. 15, 2013.** The British Columbia Ministry of Community, Sport and Cultural Development, with help from other public agencies, will assess applications and recommend funding.



STUART PARK ICE RINK: VIEW ICE CONDITIONS ONLINE

Skaters, young and young at heart, have been enjoying the outdoor rink at Stuart Park. With the growing popularity of the rink, the City of Kelowna has installed a camera that will feed to its website allowing residents and visitors to view rink conditions before heading downtown to skate.

The camera, mounted above the maintenance building in the park, is high enough to provide a bird's eye view of the area, allowing residents to see if the rink is closed for maintenance (roughly 15-20 minutes and will be indicated by signs at each corner of the rink).



Once the ice surface is removed in February or March, the camera will remain in place; however, the feed will be turned off and removed from the website.

For individuals looking to skate indoors, Rutland Arena, Capital News Centre and Memorial Area offer public skating times. Skate rentals are available for use at Rutland Arena and Capital News Centre.

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GREEN AND AFFORDABLE HOUSING IN CANADA - RESEARCH SUMMARY

This research can be used to attract further government investment for energy efficient renovations in social housing. It signals an emerging transformation in housing and energy policy, where green and affordable housing can be seen as a proven, cost-effective approach to creating healthy, vibrant communities.



Canada is committed to energy efficiency as part of its national Green Plan, which addresses the environmental issues of climate change, and reducing energy consumption. However, lacking a national housing strategy, and with social housing provision responsibility downloaded to provinces and municipalities, home energy efficiency policies have not been well regulated nor have they been widely implemented. As such, many buildings are operating at 50% below their efficiency potential. Social housing in Canada makes up less than 6% of the housing stock, and the majority of it is between 20 and 50 years old, and is very energy inefficient. Unfortunately, most social housing providers do not enjoy the financial freedom to make costly energy efficient retrofits, which could add between a 5-10% increase to overall renovation costs. FROM THIS POINT FORWARD: ENDING CUSTODIAL HOUSING FOR PEOPLE WITH MENTAL ILLNESS IN CANADA

Ten years ago, the Community Support and Research Unit (CSRU) released the <u>Housing Discussion Paper</u> to highlight critical issues and suggest new approaches to housing for people with mental illness. It has since become one of the most cited grey literature reports on housing and mental health in Canada. In November 2012, CSRU completed a new housing report aimed at improving the mental health housing system, entitled, <u>From This Point Forward: Ending Custodial Housing for People with Mental Illness in Canada</u>.

Change is possible. There are a number of programs in Canada that have transformed from custodial care models to approaches that are more reflective of best practices and CAMH is at the forefront of these efforts. Through partnerships with Supportive Housing in Peel (SHIP), Habitat Services, and Regeneration Community Services, CAMH has been instrumental in the development of housing projects that assist CAMH clients live independently in

The report details the reasons why custodial care does not support recovery from mental illness and what needs to be done to improve the mental health housing system in Canada.

HEALTH PROBLEMS OF INCARCERATED WOMEN IN BC

A report from the BC Medical Journal examined the health and well-being of women incarcerated in BC. About 10% of prison populations in BC are women and like the rest of Canada, Aboriginal people are overrepresented in the criminal justice system. Women in custody tend to be younger than the general population and of childbearing age. They are usually poorly educated and have experienced physical or sexual abuse. These women have more health concerns than non-incarcerated women, such as a greater prevalence of blood borne infections like HIV. Furthermore, an estimated 80% of incarcerated women have a mental illness. Researchers interviewed 120 women in 10 correctional facilitates in BC to discuss the health of women in prison. The main themes discussed were Addictions and Mental Health, HIV, hepatitis and other infections, health care in prison, life-skills and re-entry into society, and children, family and relationships. Some of the main concerns that came from the research were the separation between incarcerated mothers and their children, and finding housing when their prison sentence is completed. FIRST-GENERATION IMMIGRANTS HAVE GREATER RISK OF MENTAL HEALTH DISORDERS

Researchers in Toronto compared the risk of hospitalization in immigrants verses native-born Canadians for psychotic and affective disorders. Researchers matched census information with inpatient hospital admission rates for areas with large proportions of immigrants and non-immigrants in Canada. The data included over 11 million people aged 15-64 from 1996–2005. The researchers found that there is a higher risk of



admission for psychotic disorders in areas with higher proportions of first-generation immigrants, however, average income and population densities were also factors in these areas. These characteristic are intertwined with the immigrant experience, therefore it is hard to pinpoint the exact cause of psychotic risk for immigrants. 

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EMPOWERMENT KEY TO FOUNDATION STAFF SATISFACTION, REPORT FINDS

The Center for Effective Philanthropy has published a new report called Employee Empowerment: The key to foundation staff satisfaction. The report, based on a survey of 1,168 staff members at 31 foundations, offers two key findings:

- Foundation staff members are most satisfied in their jobs when they feel empowered in their day-to-day experiences at work. Feeling empowered is more important for satisfaction than other dimensions, such as perceptions of appropriateness of pay or workload.
- For staff members to feel empowered, they need to believe that management communicates a clear direction for the future, that they are working in alignment with the CEO and board, that the foundation cares about them, and that their performance reviews are fair and helpful.

EARLY READING SKILLS AND ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT TRAJECTORIES OF STUDENTS FACING POVERTY, HOMELESSNESS, AND HIGH RESIDENTIAL MOBILITY

by Herbers, J. E; Cutuli, J. J; Supkoff, L. M; et al.

This investigation tested the importance of early academic achievement for later achievement trajectories among 18,011 students grouped by level of socioeconomic risk. Students considered to be at highest risk were those who experienced homelessness or high residential mobility (HHM). HHM students were compared with students eligible for free meals, students eligible for reduced price meals, and students who were



neither HHM nor low income. Socioeconomic risk and oral reading ability in first grade predicted growth of reading and math achievement in Grades 3 through 8. Risk status predicted achievement beyond the effects of early reading scores and also moderated the prediction of later growth in reading achievement from early oral reading.

Results underscore the early emergence and persistence of achievement gaps related to poverty, the high and accumulating risk for high residential mobility students, and the significance of oral reading in first grade as both an early indicator of risk and a potential protective factor. 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NEW ALBERTA STUDY ASSESSES THEBENEFITS OF COMMUNITY HUMAN SERVICES

The Caledon Institute of Social Policy and Mount Royal University's Institute for Nonprofit Studies have released a new literature review undertaken on behalf of the Community Human Services Network of Alberta. The report presents a summary of the benefits literature in eight areas of human service. It places special emphasis on early childhood development and care, and crime prevention? the two domains with the most wide-ranging and robust evidence base. The report also highlights the challenges involved in this work related to the widely variable evidence base among the eight areas of human service and to shifts in their delivery. Key developments in evaluation methods, including the growing interest in Social Return on Investment and developmental evaluation, are considered as well. 

DOES THE GENDER OF ECE PROFESSIONALS MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

Exchange Everyday - MenTeach website reported on a German study comparing the behavior of male and female ECE workers in classrooms with children between three and six years of age: "With regard to the formal professional qualities of communication and activity, the rating of the behaviour of the female and male professionals in the individual situations yields no relevant gender effects. Thereby, also, the attachment theoretical assumption, that women interact in a more empathic attachment-oriented way, and men interact rather in a challenging exploration-oriented way, related to the ECE workers in our sample, cannot be confirmed. With this finding one could conclude that, with regard to central professional standards in dealing with children, male and female professionals do not differ. "That does not mean that, in dealing with children, the gender of the ECE workers does not play a role. At least, indications can be found that, dependent on gender, different activities are carried out with the children, and different content areas served. This is confirmed by gender-specific differences concerning the selection of material, and the resulting products. Over all, the influence of the gender of the children proves to be greater than that of the gender of the ECE workers. Amongst the professionals, it was notable that the women tend to treat girls and boys more equally, whereas the men tend to adjust their behaviour more to the gender of the child."

Since most people understand the value of taking those steps, let's go deeper. To really harness the power of LinkedIn, don't make these mistakes:

1. YOU GIVE ONLY BECAUSE YOU EXPECT TO RECEIVE

Connect with people on LinkedIn and you can write a recommendation that gets displayed on their profiles.

That's awesome, unless you're only giving recommendations because you want one in return. Then it's tacky.

For example, say you're a plumber. A pipe burst and we call you at three in the morning. You immediately rush over, fix the leak, and save us from inadvertently converting our basement into a swimming pool. I'm extremely grateful and I write you a deservedly glowing recommendation.

Then I ask you to write a recommendation for me.

The problem is, you don't know me professionally. The only thing you really know about me is that I could be heard in the background screaming like a little girl when my wife called you. How can you recommend me? You can't. You shouldn't. And you shouldn't be asked to.

Give sincere recommendations. Recommend because you want to, not because you expect to receive a recommendation in return. The people who know and respect you may return the "favor." If so, great; if not, also great. Either way you've given credit where credit is due. Read more here>>>
